JUDG MENT

DEPUTY BAILIFF: We accept that there is remorse and that the accused co-operated with the Social Security Authorities once he had been found out. But the accused only faces selected charges and had the Solicitor used the old system of charging every available charge, the total potential fine would have been vast. We feel we cannot reduce the conclusions and therefore we impose fines of £150, or in default of payment two weeks' imprisonment on counts one, three, five and seven. We impose a fine of £350, or in default of payment four weeks' imprisonment on each of counts two, four, six and eight, making a total fine of £2,000, or in default of payment twenty four

weeks' imprisonment and we order that the sum of £50 be paid by way of costs.

Now, Mr Day, I presume you wish to speak to us about time to pay.

ADVOCATE DAY: (Voice inaudible)

DEPUTY BAILIFF: Very well, £300 per month, which will, in fact, be a fraction over six months.
