Application for review of Magistrate's Decision to refuse bail

On 2nd April, 1996 the Applicant reserved his plea to:  
1 count of breaking and entering and theft (count 1); or  
1 count of aiding, assisting or participating in the said crime  
(count 2); and/or  
1 count of receiving, hiding, or withholding the property forming  
the basis of counts 1 and 2;  
and was remanded in custody.

On 23rd April, 1996 the Magistrate refused bail.

Bail granted, on condition Applicant: (a) reports to Police 3 times a week at 6.00 p.m.; (b) is subject to a 8.00 p.m. - 7.00 a.m. curfew; (c) resides at his parents home; and (d) surrenders his passport.

Application not resisted by Attorney General.

JUDGMENT

THE DEPUTY BAILIFF: You are released on bail I will just repeat the terms of the bail conditions to you.

5 You have to report to the Police three times a week at 6.00 p.m. You are under curfew from eight o'clock in the evening until seven o'clock in the morning each day. You must live with your parents at their home address. You must surrender your passport and your mother is going to put in £200 in cash.

Now, you do realise that if you breach any of those conditions you are going back to prison and the £200 will be forfeit. So watch your step.
